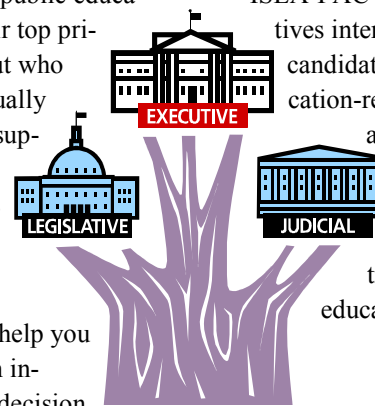
Election 2008: Why It Matters

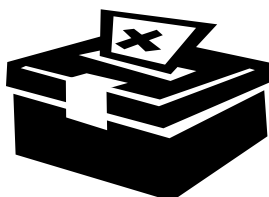

Register, Volunteer, and Vote!

All education employees have the opportunity to help elect Friends of Education on November 4. How can you help?

- ❑ Make certain that your friends, family, and colleagues are **registered to vote**. To pre-register to vote, a voter registration form must be completed and returned to the county auditor's office. The voter pre-registration deadline is 10 days prior to Election Day. As of January 1, 2008, voters can also register to vote

on Election Day at the polling place for the precinct in which they currently reside. Voters registering to vote on Election Day will be required to show proof of identity and residency.

- ❑ **Volunteer time on behalf of ISEA recommended candidates.** You can help elect pro-education candi-



dates and earn chances to win prizes in three easy steps! (1) Join the Grass Roots Education Action Team (GREAT) by

clicking on the ISEA's online Election 2008 Guide at www.isea.org. (2) Work three hours for a recommended candidate. (3) Submit an "I

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Your License is Your Responsibility

It is your professional responsibility to hold appropriate licensure for whatever teaching assignment you hold. Consequently, you should be aware of the following important licensure information.

"You must disclose any occurrence of a teaching assignment for which you are not properly licensed to the school official responsible for determining teaching assignments."

- The expiration of your license is linked to your birth month.
- Your licensure and endorsement information is readily available to you and to the public on the BOEE Website at www.state.ia.us/boee. Any individ-

ual can file a BOEE complaint against you and/or an administrator for improper licensure without directly contacting you or the school district.

- No compensation shall be recovered by a teacher for services rendered while without a valid teaching license.

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Taking Charge of Your Classroom

Whether you are a beginning or career teacher, taking charge of your classroom is an important component of successful teaching. Below are excerpts from an article by Gail Tillery that appeared in a recent online issue of *Teacher Magazine*. Gail is a mentoring coordinator at a suburban high school in northeast Georgia.

You are the king or queen of

your room. Students look to you to set the atmosphere and the agenda. Be their leader. Set boundaries, make consequences clear, and follow through if necessary. Students need a teacher and a leader.

Dress the part; act the part; speak the part. Set yourself apart from your students. Dress professionally—it makes you look and feel that way. If you have Face-



book and MySpace pages, take them down. Do not discuss your

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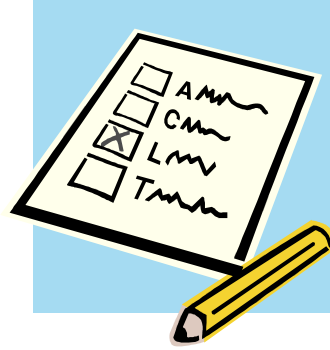

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Helped” card or report your hours using the online form. The more hours you volunteer, the greater your chance of winning prizes—which include Amazon.com gift certificates, a DVD player, and a Des Moines weekend package that includes theater tickets and hotel.

- ❑ **Vote absentee—and encourage others to do the same.** You

may vote absentee in person at your county auditor’s office prior to Election Day. County auditors’ offices are open on the two Saturdays directly preceding the election. Some county auditors also use satellite absentee voting stations to pro-



vide absentee voting at places other than the auditor’s office. To find out whether satellite stations are planned for your county, contact your county auditor.

Licensure

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- If a BOEE review of your records verifies that you are assigned instructional duties for which you are not licensed or endorsed, either by grade level or subject area, the BOEE may initiate a complaint against both you and the administrator responsible for the inappropriate assignment of instructional duties.

- You must disclose any occurrence of a teaching assignment for which you are not properly licensed to the school official responsible for determining teaching assignments. Failure to disclose an inappropriate teaching assignment is a violation of the BOEE ethical standards. Once disclosure is made administrators must make appropriate adjustments to your teaching assignment. Failure to do so is,

again, a violation of the BOEE ethical standards. If an appropriate assignment is not made, Iowa law requires that you report this occurrence to the BOEE for further action.

- It is a violation of BOEE ethical standards to sign an employment contract which requires the performance of duties that you are not legally qualified to perform.
